**GOODBYE, MR. CHIPS** was a Panavision [anamorphic] 70mm blow up. Australian Gala Charity Previews were at the St James Sydney in 35mm and at the Capitol Melbourne in 70mm. Both screenings were held on the evening of the 14<sup>th</sup> January 1970.

There was one 70mm print of **GOODBYE, MR. CHIPS** in circulation in Australia.

After the ten-week season at the Capitol Melbourne, the 70mm print was used at the Center Cinema in Canberra followed by the Avalon in Hobart. There was no reissue campaign for **GOODBYE, MR. CHIPS** ...

In 1974, **GOODBYE, MR. CHIPS** was programmed into a film festival at Village Cinema City, titled 'summer festival of 70mm musicals'. The festival included The Sound of Music, West Side Story, Hello, Dolly!, Star!, The Great Caruso and Sweet Charity. The advertisement for *Seven Brides for Seven Brothers* plus *Goodbye, Mr. Chips* was on the 1<sup>st</sup> December 1974.

**PAINT YOUR WAGON** was a Panavision [anamorphic] 70mm blow up. The film premiered in 70mm in Australia at the Barclay Sydney on the 5<sup>th</sup> March 1970. There were four 70mm prints of **PAINT YOUR WAGON** in circulation in Australia with the season at the Royal Perth, the longest run of 96 weeks in Australia.



Reading through the release dates [bottom page], there were three print moves for *Print 1* and one print move for *Print 2* and *Print 3*. *Print 3* at the Barclay Melbourne was moved to the Trak in Melbourne for a seven-week season on 30<sup>th</sup> December 1971.

**PAINT YOUR WAGON** which originally opened in 35mm 4Track Magnetic at the George in Brisbane, was reissued *For the First time in 70mm* at the Forum cinema Brisbane for a two-week season on the 15<sup>th</sup> December 1972.

In 1976 **PAINT YOUR WAGON** was also reissued in 35mm at the Village Australia cinema in Melbourne on the 29<sup>th</sup> May 1976 and at the Village Cinema City in Sydney on the 9<sup>th</sup> July 1976.

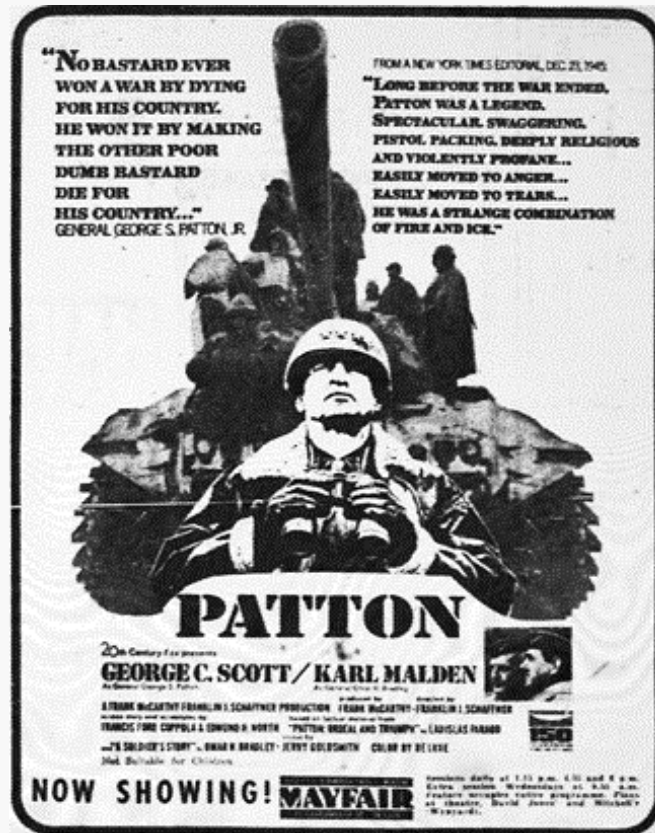

PATTON was advertised in tabloids as, Photographed in Dimension 150. The opening season in Australia commenced at the Cinema Centre in Melbourne in 70mm on the 19<sup>th</sup> March 1970. There were two 70mm prints of PATTON in circulation in Australia.



There were no D150 screens installed in Australia. However, there was a proposal drafted on the 11th July 1969 by Hoyts Theatres for installation at their Sydney Plaza cinema for the release of Patton. This proposal did not eventuate due to the popularity and 69-week season of Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid at the Plaza. Patton was later released at the Hoyts Mayfair on the 8th July 1970. The proposed D150 screen at the Hoyts Plaza Sydney was to be curved to 120-degrees, with a Screen Radius of 31 feet 6 inches, Picture Height of 27 feet 6 inches and Picture Chord Width - 55 feet 0 inches.

PATTON was reissued at the 35mm equipped Roma cinema in Sydney on the 29<sup>th</sup> April 1971, two weeks after Patton had won 8 Academy Awards including Best Picture. This 16-week season became the longest season for PATTON in Australia.

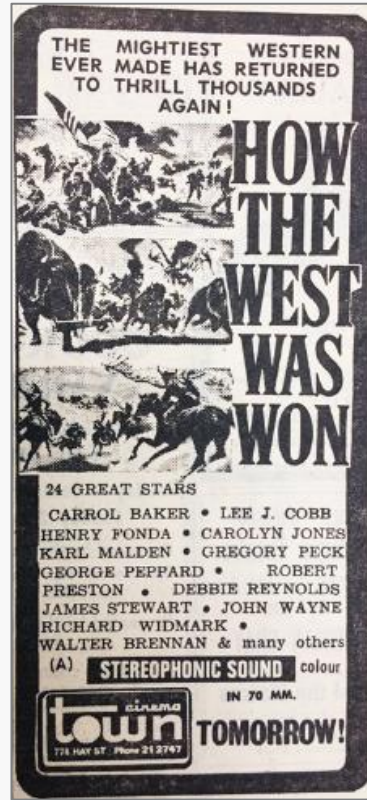
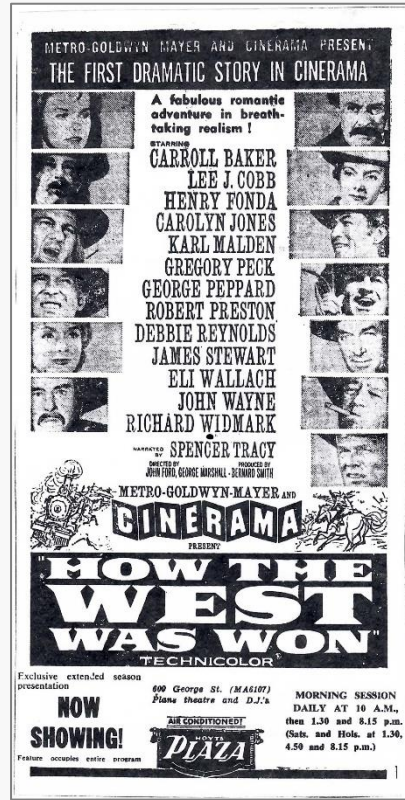

**How the West Was Won** opened in three strip Cinerama at the Plaza Sydney on the 26<sup>th</sup> December 1962 and at the Plaza Melbourne on the 1<sup>st</sup> January 1963. For the film's *First Time in 70mm* reissue in 1970, there was only one 70mm print in circulation in Australia, with the seasons at the Capitol Melbourne and Town Perth the only key city presentations.

A 70mm reissue of *How the West Was Won* was proposed for the Sydney Plaza. However, the long running seasons of *The Battle of Britain* and *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid* prevented the programming of the print at the theatre. Screenings of *How the West Was Won* and *Russian Adventure* were intended to form part of a Cinerama Festival after the theatres release of *Juggernaut* in 1975. Whilst the Cinerama retrospective did take place (as planned), it only included *It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World* and *Grand Prix*; these films opening in 70mm Cinerama on the 20th February 1975 and the 13th March 1975 respectively. Noteworthy to mention that the revivals shown were presented on a DP75 projector with platters and was therefore the only time we ever really saw *Cinerama out of one hole!*

**AIRPORT** was advertised in tabloids as, Produced in Todd-AO. The Australasian premiere was held at the Ascot Sydney on the 15<sup>th</sup> April 1970. The Melbourne premiere was held on the 16<sup>th</sup> April 1970 at the Chelsea cinema. Both premieres were attended by Van Heflin.



There were four 70mm prints of **AIRPORT** in circulation in Australia with the season in Sydney, the longest run of 40 weeks. Tabloid advertising in the West Australian has confirmed the Perth Piccadilly opening was in 35mm and on the 29<sup>th</sup> October 1970 became a 70mm print. This also seems apparent for the Brisbane opening, with 70mm appearing in the Courier Mail tabloid advertising on the 31<sup>st</sup> July 1970, 15 weeks after the opening. There is also speculation Adelaide may have also opened in 35mm and latter into their season, became a 70mm presentation. Only the Sydney and Melbourne opening seasons were advertised in Technicolor and in Todd-AO.

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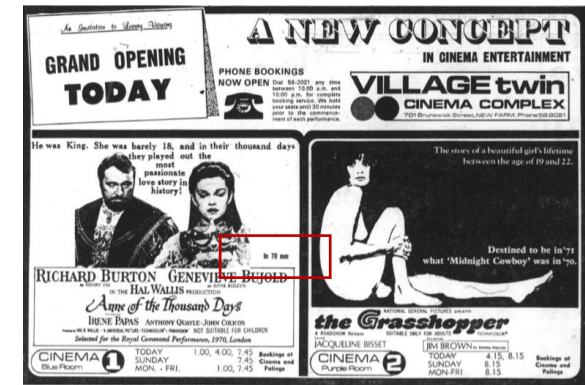

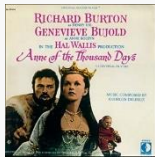

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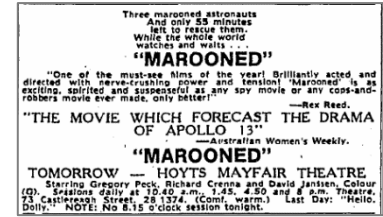

**MAROOINED** was a Panavision [anamorphic] 70mm blow up. During 1970, the exhibition of Columbia Pictures films in Australia moved from the Greater Union Organisation to Hoyts Theatres. As a result of this change, **MAROOINED** was the first Columbia 70mm release to open at a Hoyts theatre in Australia – premiered Mayfair Sydney on the 27th May 1970. There were two 70mm prints of **MAROOINED** in circulation in Australia.

The switch in distributor/exhibitor allegiance took place around March/April 1970, with existing city and suburban contractual release arrangements being fulfilled in a business-like fashion. Some slight anomalies arose: for example, Columbia's hit musical, *Funny Girl*, went going almost immediately into Hoyts Parramatta Astra in 70mm after it finished a long run at GU's Sydney Barclay. The following are the initial Sydney suburban release dates of major Columbia films around this time at Hoyts Suburban Cinemas: *Funny Girl* on 02/04/70 at Hoyts Parramatta Astra in 70mm; *Castle Keep* on 28/05/70 at Hoyts Parramatta Roxy in 35mm, and *Marooned* on 27/08/70 again, in 70mm, at the Astra Parramatta. Whilst *Funny Girl* and *Castle Keep* had both opened in 70mm at GU's Barclay and Forum theatres respectively in the Sydney CBD, prior to their initial suburban releases at Parramatta, *Marooned* had opened in 70mm at Hoyts Mayfair in the Sydney CBD. All three films would be given a broader 35mm suburban release by Hoyts Theatres towards the ends of the Parramatta seasons.

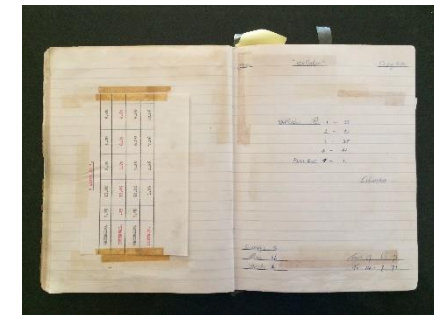

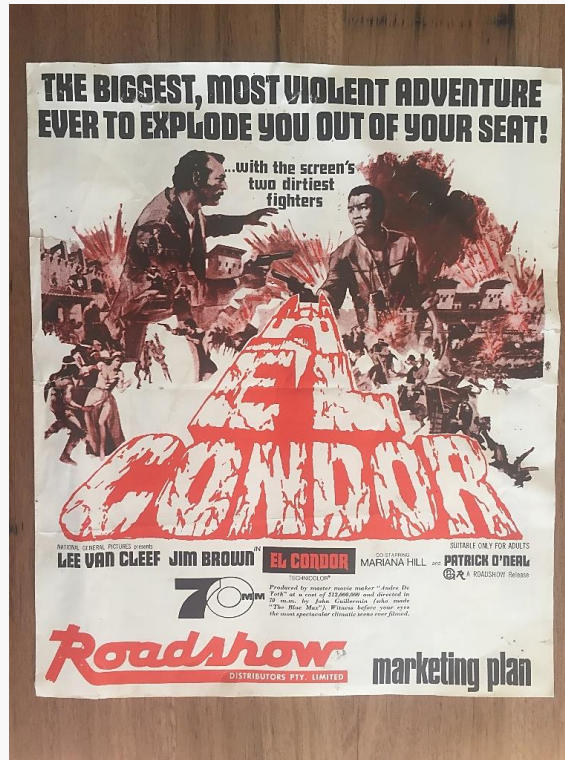
